Motor Development Center Makes News!

The staff of the WV Motor Development Center has been very busy this year. In addition to conducting children's physical activity programs, the Center had a very successful summer day camp under the direction of Kerry McKenzie. Camp Choosy focused on good nutrition, active play, and summer FUN.

A significant gift was presented to Center Director, Linda Carson and Program Coordinator, Kerry McKenzie. In Spring 2005, Joyce Lang presented the center with a beautiful 6'x 6' hand stitched red quilt. The quilt includes the fronts of twenty one shirts that have represented the Center programs over the years. The meticulous hand stitching is revealed in a beautiful puzzle piece pattern. Lang donated the quilt on behalf of her daughter, Stephanie, and her granddaughter, Rachel. Stephanie participated in KinderSkills and KinderSplash when she was a child and now Rachel, her daughter, is active in KinderSkills and the Splash programs. The Center is grateful to the Langs for their generous contribution of the beautiful quilt representing many years of children's programs. The Center is in the process of identifying an appropriate location for public display.

This spring Dr. Carson was on ABC's *Good Morning America*

discussing a research project she is conducting with overweight children in West Virginia. She is among the first to study the benefits of playing Dance-Dance Revolution (DDR), an active video game that children play with their feet instead of their hands. Dr. Carson is studying the effects that playing DDR will have on endothelial function of arteries, cholesterol, aerobic capacity, and percent fat. Preliminary findings are very promising. The study has received national attention and will be showcased on the Discovery Health Channel on October 16th at 7:00 pm. It will be re-aired on the Discovery

channel but the air date is not released yet.

Dr. Carson was selected to be the keynote speaker and head trainer for a Cabinet level initiative mandated to Head Start for childhood obesity prevention. She has been working with the six state, mid-Atlantic Region III of Head Start implementing a pilot program known as "I Am Moving, I Am Learning." The initiative is based on Dr. Carson's preschool physical education curriculum.

Dean's Message

Your School of Physical Education remains committed to student success and to fulfilling our teaching, research and service missions. The 2004-2005 Fall and Summer academic terms were filled with new opportunities for our faculty, staff, students and alumni. My summary report represents those new and exciting activities that build on the School's strengths. The

School's strategic foci remain as follows: fitness/ wellness programs and activities, integration of technology into the curriculum, faculty/staff/student development activities, and internationalizing the School's academic programs. I hope you enjoy reading about the progress made in these areas. Your feedback and comments are most welcome.

Faculty/Staff Accomplishments

During the 2005 Spring and Summer terms, the School's faculty gained national exposure for their service and research programs. Dr. Linda Carson presented the status of children's wellness/fitness programs and the concept of Dance-Dance Revolution on NBC's The Today Show. Dr. Ronald Althouse (Professor, Sociology/Anthropology) and I discussed Race and Sport in American Culture on Tony Brown's PBS television program. Dr. Floyd Jones visited Venezuela to establish links with select colleges/universities in Venezuela. During August, Drs. Andrew Ostrow, Jack Watson, and Sam Zizzi presented papers at the International Sport & Exercise Psychology Conference in Australia. The School is experiencing a turnover in staff positions. Reorganization has eliminated one position, and Debra Hardesty has been hired to provide secretarial support to academic faculty.

Strategic Planning Support

During Fall 2005, the Dean's office will support the following faculty-requested strategic initiatives: Hire grants and contracts part-time support staff member (one year only); hire student assistant to help collect student assessment data, GTA (one year); hire technology GTA (one year); and establish technology classrooms in 297 Coliseum and 136A Coliseum. Athletic Coaching Education (ACE)

DDR is a fast-paced game used by participants to perform dance moves as they are instructed on a video/television screen. The dancing is done on a mat with sensors that records movements and allows the player to earn or lose points based on how well they perform the dance instructions. PEIA is funding the study. The interview was mentioned in several major

Dr. Ruth Kershner received the AAHPERD Midwest District Health University College professor of the year. She also accepted the American Association of Health: University/College Health Education Professor of the Year.

Dr. Sandra K. Vanin, director of the Friday Clinic at WVU's Center for Excellence in Disabilities, has been named commissioner of the state Bureau of Senior Services by Governor Joe Manchin. Dr. Vanin, a native of Arthurdale, WV, helped establish the WVU clinic in 1992. It serves over 200 children with disabilities annually, encouraging them to participate in health and wellness activities. She has taught in the School of Physical Education since 1991, and began working at WVU as an adjunct instructor in 1987.

Bruce Wilmoth, Director of the 18th National Youth Sports Program at WVU, hosted the program from June 16-July 22 in the Shell Building and Coliseum. The NYSP is open to disadvantaged youth aged 10-16 in Monongalia County, WV. The program is free, and daily sessions run from 9 AM until noon, with lunch served. The program educates participants on fitness and provides counseling in academics and drug/alcohol awareness. A free physical exam is provided the first day of the program. The Indianapolis-based NYSP was founded in 1968 and has chapters nationwide, including four in West Virginia at Bluefield State College, West Virginia State University, Marshall University and WVU.

Dr. Sang Suk Yoo, Hoseo University, Korea, completed a oneyear visiting professorship in the PETE program.

Sport and Exercise Psychology (SEP)

Dana Brooks. Professor and Dean, was presented the Midwest District Honor Award at the Spring AAHPERD Convention. Dana received grant funding to invite the public to hear a formal presentation titled "Before Brown: Black Community Sports in West Virginia" and view posters depicting West Virginia African American segregated high schools and community life throughout the state. His current project includes conducting oral and pictorial analyses of the integration of sports at West Virginia University following the Brown v. Board of Education U.S. Supreme Court decision.

Ed Etzel, Associate Professor, along with Sam Maniar of Ohio State, presented a panel on ethics at the first NCAA "Psychological Health Issues of the Collegiate Student-Athlete" seminar on February 4-5 in Indianapolis.

Andrew Ostrow. Professor and Program Coordinator, announced that the Sport and Exercise Psychology Program at WVU hosted the AASP's Southeast Sport Psychology Student Research Symposium, April 1-2, 2005 on our campus. Dr. Ostrow also agreed to endorse a proposal submitted by Dr. Floyd Jones for faculty academic exchange with the Universidad Pedagogica Experimental Libertador, Maracay, Venezuela. In addition, with support from faculty, Dr. Ostrow approved the proposal for Dr. Qiwei Gan from P.R. China to complete postdoctoral training in Sport and Exercise Psychology at WVU during the

2005-06 academic year.

Dr. Mohn Sofian, Associate Professor, Faculty of Educational Studies, University of Putra, Malaysia, has received a Fulbright Scholarship to conduct research with faculty in the Sport and Exercise Psychology Program during the Fall 2005 semester.

Jack Watson, Assistant Professor; and Sam Zizzi, Assistant Professor; were asked to present at the World Congress of Sport Psychology in Sydney, Australia, on Aug 11-15, 2005.

Sam Zizzi agreed to serve as mentor for a visiting Fulbright scholar from Malaysia this Fall. They will study exercise behavior and cross-cultural influences. Dr. Zizzi also had a paper published (with several co-authors) in the January edition of the International Sport Journal. The research project was entitled "Establishing a hierarchy of psychological skills: Coaches, athletic trainers, and psychologists' uses and perceptions of psychological skills training." In addition, Dr. Zizzi visited Italy in an effort to establish potential faculty and student exchanges. As a result, an exchange student from Italy was accepted into the ACE program for the Fall semester. This student will also teach Italian on the downtown campus.

LaVell Edwards, Brigham Young University's most celebrated football coach, was the featured speaker at the annual Don Nehlen Lecture Series at the Erickson Alumni Center on September 14, 2005. Coach Edwards attended Utah State University, where he received a B.S. degree in Education. He went on to receive an M.S. degree at the University of Utah, and his Ed.D. at Brigham

Young University. He earned all-conference honors, and served a two-year commitment in the Army before beginning his full-time coaching career at Granite High School in Salt Lake City, where he coached for eight years before accepting a job at BYU.

In the first 47 years of BYU football, the team won only 43 percent of their games. That would all begin to change in 1972 with the hiring of Edwards. Over his exceptional 29-year career, BYU became a national power, winning 71.6 percent of their games from 1972 to 2000. During this impressive span, Edwards led the Cougars to a 257-101-3 record, 20 WAC titles—including 11 in a row, 13 top-25 finishes, four top-10 finishes and the 1984 National Championship.

WVU established the Don Nehlen Distinguished Lecture Series in 2001 after Nehlen retired as the University's head football coach. The lecture series brings outstanding coaches from professional, collegiate and international sports to the WVU campus. Past speakers include former Michigan football coach Bo Schembechler, American Football Coaches Association Executive Director Grant Teaff, retired college and NFL coach Dick MacPherson, and men's head basketball coach at Syracuse University Jim Boeheim.

This year's lecture series was partially underwritten by First National Bank.

Don Nehlen was inducted into the College Football Hall of Fame in South Bend, Indiana, in December 2004.

"Through the Years" - Alumni Updates

Ruth Julien (BS '38), of Berkeley Springs, WV, was honored for 50 years with the American Red Cross this summer. Ruth recently retired as volunteers chairman for the Morgan County chapter after 20 years in that role. Demie Mainieri (BS '52), of Fort Lauderdale, FL, is retired as a collegiate director of athletics and head baseball coach. He is now a special assignment scout for the Chicago Cubs.

James R. McCormick (BS '63), of Lexington, KY, was inducted into the WVU Sports Hall of Fame, Class of 2005. Jim started on the WVU men's basketball team from 1961-63. During his WVU career the Mountaineers were 70-18, won three Southern Conference titles, and went to two NCAA tournaments. 
1964-65 WVU basketball team recenty honored him at their 40 year reunion. Fritz is survived by a son, Eric, and a daughter, Rayna.

He was named to the Lynchburg College Sports Hall of Fame in 1984. Dr. Moon was department chair and director of intercollegiate and intramural activities at Lynchburg College from 1979-1989. He taught first-aid and CPR for the American Red Cross. He also officiated high school sports and was honored in 1989 with the Distinguished Service Award from the Virginia High School League Coaches Association for more than 30 years of service as a game official and supporter of the league.

need for laboratory and classroom space. State appropriations for colleges/universities within the State are expected to decline. Thus, our School will need to generate additional revenue source funding to support our academic programs.

Her gravelly voice was one that you couldn't forget. Sara Cree (MS '37) also had a jovial temperament and a strong interest in people that always made her fun to talk with.

Sara's desire to make sure that

the School of Physical Education received worthwhile support from her at some point motivated her to create a life income gift. She used a family farm that she had inherited years before as the funding asset for the gift arrangement.

Her gift earned an income tax deduction for her at the time it was created, and she avoided the tax on the significant increase in the farm's value over the years. Sara received quarterly income until her recent death in October 2004.

Sara was actually Dr. Cree, a professor of physical education at Shepherd College (now Shepherd University) for 32 years and became the department chair as well. She earned her bachelor's and master's degrees from WVU and her Ed. D. from Penn State. You'll find a building named for her on the Shepherd campus reflecting her many years' service as a valued educator. Sara's exemplary work led to her induction into the School of Physical Education's Hall of Fame in 1990. She was truly proud of that honor.

Sara made a natural choice at the time that she set up the life income gift to require that, after she passed away, the remaining funds would be used to reward Physical Education faculty members who exhibit excellence in teaching each year. That meant a lot to her.

Her choice was a good one. Funding for faculty development is one of the School's main priorities for support, just as are funds for technology upgrades for classrooms and computer labs, for supplementing fitness and wellness programs, for creating a scholarship or fellowship, and for library resources.

So Sara's gift helped her to meet her retirement income needs first and has now provided an endowed fund that will last forever and will generate annual income to aid those faculty members who are doing a great job. It will also make her a part of what happens within the School of Physical Education for many generations to come!
